By identifying these target areas, PBM Plus can work with the client to identify and develop client specific strategies to educate members and physicians to switch to the most cost-effective drugs within the category. Other non-pharmacologic strategies may also be identified which the client could implement to address particular medical conditions in the workplace or through other avenues. Financial reports will also summarize the impact of the various cost containment measures that have been implemented for the client.

Clinical reporting focuses on the most frequently prescribed medications and therapeutic categories. These reports can be used to identify trends of over-utilization, under-utilization, or medication use patterns that may not be consistent with national guidelines and recommendations. This information can be used to develop educational strategies targeted at both physicians and members.

PBM Plus also has a unique, retrospective clinical tool that can review pharmacy claim detail and generate clinical and economic recommendations to physicians and members. This tool was developed for use by Omnicare consultant pharmacists in the nursing home setting and has been modified to meet the needs of ambulatory patients in the community setting.
